The Government has thought it right to continue with our long tradition of offering sanctuary for those who are refugees from tyranny, as we did in the case of refugees from Germany in the 1930s.

On the wider issue of immigration, the Government is, as you know, determined to imprement in full the policies which were set out on page 20 of our Manifesto.

I am very concerned with the lofty attitude being adopted in some areas of the Party with regard to the Vietnamese refugees.

As you know, I represent an urban, marginal seat, won by us at the last election for the first time. The victory was largely due to massively increased support amongst trades unionists, council tenants and the members of our working men's clubs.

Amongst the reasons for this movement in support was our commitment to reduce immigration. This is an area in which Governments have, in the past, given undertakings which they have then failed to meet.

I believe that whatever we may consider to be the differences between immigrants and refugees it is a distinction that our new-found supporters will not be readily persuaded to make. The Government's credibility is obviously going to be a very precious thing in the difficult months ahead and I implore you not to use up some of the goodwill that exists by allowing the intake of quantities of refugees which the people who count, the people we are elected to represent, though they may sympathise, do not wish to join us in our over-crowded island.
